



Title: The title should not exceed 14 words. Use words that can be used for indexing. In the case of multiple authors, the names should be identified with superscripted numbers and the addresses listed according to the numbers, e.g. A. P. Onwualu¹ and G. B. Musa².

Abstract: This document presents the style requirements for the layout of submissions to International Conference. The abstract text is limited to 250 words, 11pt Times New Roman, preceded by "Abstract:" in bold, preceded by a 6pt spacing and followed by a 18pt spacing.

Keywords: A maximum of four keyword entries, (separated by commas and a period at the end)

1. INTRODUCTION

FORMAT OF THE POSTER MANUSCRIPT:

1. All manuscripts written in double spaced Times New Roman font type size 12 in Word file.
2. The poster should include formatted text, tables, figures, and references including Figures and Tables.

2. METHODOLOGY

Main Body: This section can vary depending on the nature of the paper. For papers involving experiments, the methods, experimental design and details of the procedure should be given such that another researcher can verify it. Standard procedures however should not be presented. Rather, authors should refer to other sources. This section should also contain description of equipment and statistical analysis where applicable. For a paper that involves theoretical analysis, this is where the theory is presented.

The sub-headings should be in lower case letters and should also be left justified. Sub-sub headings should be in italics. All headings, sub-headings and sub-sub-headings should be in bold font. Headings and sub-headings should be identified with numbers such as 1; 1.1; 1.1.1 etc. For the sub-headings, the first letter of every word should be capitalized.

3. RESULTS AND DISCUSSION

Thereafter, detailed results are presented in descriptive, tabular, or graphical forms. On the other hand, discuss how the data, graphs, and other illustrations have answered questions and described problem areas, as previously discussed in the introduction.

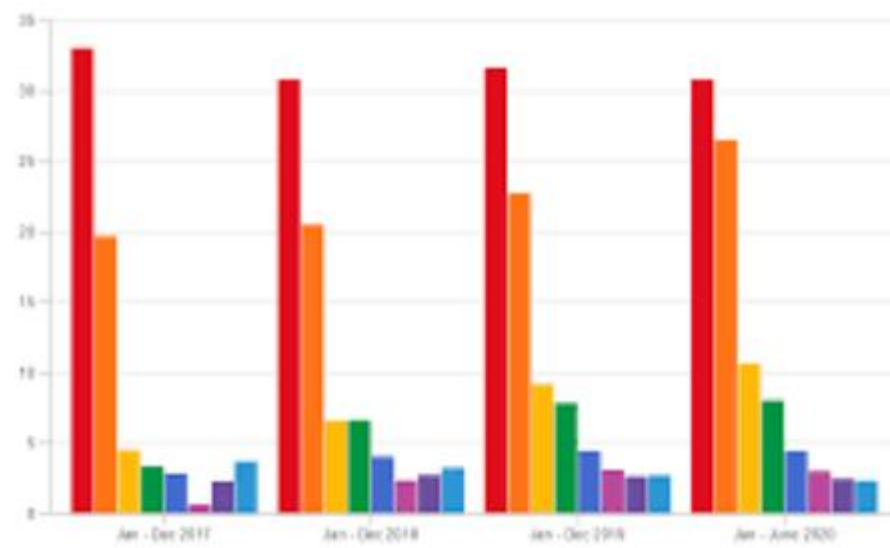


Fig 1. Monthly Rainfall

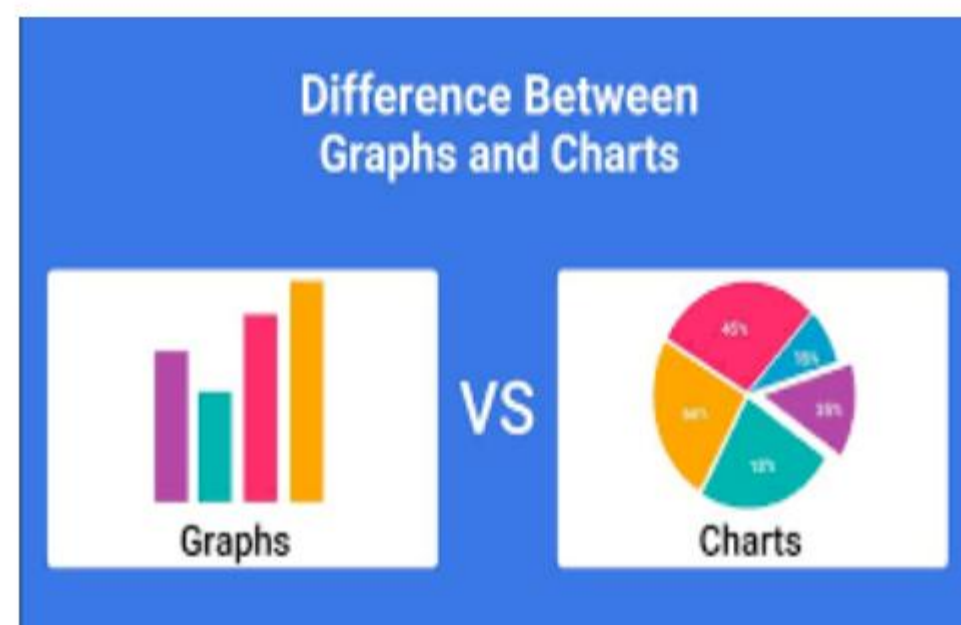


Fig 2. a Monthly Rainfall b. chart for ...

Tables should be numbered Table 1 onwards. The captions are Times New Roman 10-point italic. Ensure figures and tables are within the printable area of the page.
